# What we know about the impact of enrichment activities beyond the classroom

### 1. Successful and safe students

Afterschool enrichment program participation correlates to heightened social emotional learning and "soft skills," improved reading and math performance, increases in class participation and attendance, decreases in smoking and drug use in minors, and a higher likelihood of employment by age 29. (Youthgov)

### 2. Students ready for their futures

Consistent participation in afterschool programs correlates with lower dropout rates, fewer risky behaviors, increased college- and career- readiness, and improved academic achievement for low-income students. (National Conference of State Legislatures)

### 3. Supported families, healthier economy

Parents and guardians who do not have access to childcare miss an average of eight days of work per year, and this decreased worker productivity costs businesses up to \$300 billion annually. Free afterschool programs keep parents at work longer, which means a healthier economy and, more importantly, that their family can earn more income to support itself. (Barnett & Gareis)

### 4. Overcoming the achievement gap

Students who come from low-income families miss out on 6,000 learning hours by sixth grade, compared to their middle- and upper-class peers simply because they cannot afford pay-to-play activities. This learning gap only increases over time. (Ed100)

#### ROI

With every \$1 invested in afterschool programs, at least \$3 are saved through increasing youth's earning potential, improving academic performance, and reducing crime and juvenile delinquency. (Afterschool Alliance, 2020)





The year was 2004, and for a variety of reasons, the landscape for extracurricular activities was bleak. In most suburban schools, the answer was simple: families formed booster clubs and raised money to offset the costs. However, for many urban families, money was limited and booster clubs weren't an option. For this reason, a few committed individuals came together with the belief that no child should be without these lifeshaping extracurricular experiences. Thanks to their efforts, and a one-time anonymous \$80,000 donation, a districtwide booster club known as Student Activities Foundation (now Activities Beyond the Classroom) was born.

By providing a broad range of programs to students each year, from arts to athletics and STEM to life skills, we reach and inspire kids across our community.

### **ABC Clubs**

These completely free afterschool clubs give students opportunities to learn about new activities, hobbies, and skills that they otherwise may not have the opportunity to learn about. These activities span the breadth of athletics, arts, STEM, life skills, and other activities. Clubs are designed thoughtfully with the communities they are implemented in to meet the needs and interests of local students. Clubs are offered three times per week for 30 weeks, and also include free food (including a snack and a meal), social emotional learning, and mentorship.

### ABC Fine Arts Clubs

This free arts enrichment program targets implementation at schools that are underserved in the arts. Through it, students participate in art activities of their choice for thirty weeks, where they practice and work towards a culminating project. Students also receive nutritious food, mentorship, and social emotional learning opportunities. At the end of the Fall and Spring semesters, students showcase their projects and share what they learn in the clubs.

# World Languages

Languages are more than ways to communicate. The words we use help us to connect, express ourselves, and share pieces of our cultures and worlds with each other. ABC supports and runs several free programs teaching world languages across CPS, including Spanish and American Sign Language (ASL).

### Spanish and ASL

In the 2022-2023 school year, 65 students at Rockdale Academy participated in Spanish lessons. Students learned the basics of the Spanish language, including numbers, letters, and common phrases.

At Woodford School, nine students participated in American Sign Language classes afterschool. The participants met once per week for three months with the activity instructor and interpreter, where they learned to sign their names, letters, numbers, emergency language, and common phrases, as well as basic conversational techniques. ABC is incredibly proud of these students, who are now equipped to make their community a bit more welcoming for students who are hard of hearing.

### Biliteracy before High School

Forty eighth grade students at The Academy of Multilingual Immersion Studies (AMIS) were joined by their families and honored for achieving language proficiency in a second world language. The Academy of World Languages (AWL) joined to recognize qualifying sixth through eighth grade students for their language gains. Approximately 100 students attended the year-end celebration recognizing the program participants for their work practicing and studying a second language. After presenting what they learned, the students were served foods representing each culture of the languages represented. All students earning high school credits were recognized for their proficiency in their language of study.

### **Ohio Seal of Biliteracy**

A Seal of Biliteracy recognizes graduating seniors who can demonstrate high levels of proficiency in English and at least one other language. ABC supported this program by

recognizing each qualified student with a certificate of completion and providing them with a graduate medal. ABC aligns its language programs with our elementary language celebrations so students can continue language studies in high school. Sixty students participated in the program, and 30 graduating seniors received the seal of biliteracy. In addition, several juniors qualified to receive the seal in their senior year.



# Live a Language Foundation dissolution and contribution to ABC

The Live a Language Foundation was founded in 2015 to promote world language learning and cross cultural understanding. The Foundation promoted students from all backgrounds pursuing language skills to support a strong global economy, prepare students for careers, and increase

cultural sensitivity. When the foundation realized it needed to dissolve, it sent all remaining funds to Activities Beyond the Classroom to support low-income students pursuing educations in world languages.







# High School Student Enrichment

### Martial Arts at Aiken

During Summer Scholars 2021, ABC offered martial arts to Aiken students as a way to keep youth fit, encourage mindfulness, increase focus, and build the social-emotional skills of discipline and motivation. The program received such positive results and continued to be highly sought after once Summer Scholars ended, so ABC worked with Aiken High School to pilot an afterschool Martial Arts program for students in 9th-12th grades. The piloted activity reached capacity at 18 students and eventually had a waiting list to enroll. Students learned and practiced martial arts techniques, built social-emotional skills, and character. Because of the popularity of this program, martial arts will be forming as a school-day class in 2023.



# Drivers Ed pilot program at Aiken High School

Six new drivers are on the road, thanks to ABC's pilot program. The program, launched in spring of 2023 in collaboration with Scott's Driving Academy, aims to provide drivers education to students who could not otherwise afford it. Learning to drive opens up many opportunities, such as more choices in work/ professions, the flexibility to run errands, and the ability to travel to new places. Additionally, having a driver's license provides independence and autonomy, which are critical for personal growth and development.

This program goes beyond skill development and improves student safety. Car accidents are the leading cause of death for teenagers in the United States, with the number one cause of accidents being cited as driving inexperience. By providing students with the opportunity to learn to drive safely, ABC is creating a safer environment for all drivers on the road.

## **Summer Scholars**

# Cincinnati Public Schools partners with ABC to provide summer enrichment

Cincinnati Public Schools invited all students, preschool through grade 12, to participate in the four-week Summer Scholars program. The free program, including transportation and meals, ran through the month of June and was available at all CPS schools. Parents had the option of signing up for a half-or full-day session. Students started their day with academic classes in the morning, followed by lunch and then enrichment hours. During enrichment, students at 20 Cincinnati Public Schools engaged in ABC program offerings. By leveraging the successful ABC Club model, students were given options of how they wanted to spend their enrichment time. Options included soccer, tennis, pottery, dance, video game design, and many more.

ABC partnered with 20 Cincinnati Public Schools to provide enrichment programming for Summer Scholars in 2022.

# JAZZ FESTIVAL

Presented by Activities Beyond the Classroom

The second CPS International Jazz Festival returned May 7, 2022. Internationally famous jazz saxophonist Joan Chamorro from Barcelona, Spain joined 107 students and 11 regional jazz musicians for a full day of workshops, masterclasses, and performance opportunities, followed by an evening performance on the main stage at the Aronoff Center. Because cost of tickets was a barrier to access for families at the previous Jazz Festival, ABC waived ticket fees and allowed all members of the public free access to the show. By the time the instruments started playing, 1,200 seats were full in the Aronoff Center (about double the attendance from the first Jazz Festival).

The second Jazz Festival increased impact on the Cincinnati community by 153%. "It was outstanding to look out from the stage and see almost the entire orchestra section of the house filled," Sally Grimes commented. "To know that all of these families and individuals were here to celebrate Jazz and these students... to know that perhaps they'd all wanted to come last time but couldn't because there was a ticket price, was amazing. We've learned from that. The Jazz Festival will remain free and accessible in future years, so that anyone who wants to learn about and appreciate jazz will be able to."

The third CPS International Jazz Festival, hosted by Activities Beyond the Classroom, returned to Cincinnati on May 6, 2023, at the Aronoff Center for the Performing Arts. Acclaimed jazz artist and educator Joan Chamorro returned, this time accompanied by eight of his Barcelona-based Sant Andreu Jazz Band students.

ABC also partnered with the International Sister Cities Association to bring a new visual art installation to the lobby of the Aronoff before the show. The installation included pieces of art by children all over the world, including Japan, Zimbabwe, Ukraine, and China, all inspired by friendship.









# Barcelona Jazz

September 1-8, 2022, Activities Beyond the Classroom (ABC) partnered with the Kennedy Heights Arts Center and Cincinnati Public Schools (CPS) to take eleven students across the Atlantic to a jazz festival in Barcelona, Spain.

In addition to several parent chaperones, the CPS Middle School Jazz Combo was accompanied on their trip by Dr. Isidore Rudnick, the Fine Arts Curiculum Manager and Director of the CPS Jazz Academy, as well as ABC's Executive Director, Sally Grimes.

This opportunity was made possible by the May 2022 Jazz Festival, which earned the invitation for Cincinnati students to play during the festival and inspired an anonymous donor to fund the trip for talented students. The students performed at the Jazzing Festival de Sant Andreu to a packed audience of jazz enthusiasts. The students also attended intimate workshops led by professional musicians, gaining valuable insight to their craft. Throughout the weekend, the CPS students had the opportunity to socialize and perform with student musicians from Barcelona and the Canary Islands, forming new friendships that cross international boundaries.

ABC is incredibly grateful for the partnership of the Fine Arts Curriculum Manager at Cincinnati Public Schools, and all that he contributed to this trip for the students.

# **High School Programs**

### **High School Athletics**

- ABC employs a total of 18 staff members dedicated to equitable and accessible athletics programming in Cincinnati
- ~4,100 total student athletes at 13 High Schools (7-12)

### **Athletics Strategic Plan**

ABC's Senior Manager of Athletics worked with the team of athletic directors and leadership team to develop a strategic plan to grow the impact and reach of athletic programming.

### Feeding student athletes

In partnership with La Soupe, ABC started an innovative pilot program to fight food insecurity and provide students with nutritious food. In Spring 2023, 120 fresh and healthy meals were delivered to Oyler School each week in advance of practices and games to make sure student-athletes were properly nourished before intense physical activity. ABC plans to grow this partnership and feed as many students as possible.

### **University of Cincinnati** writes for change

In the Spring of 2023, ABC partnered with the University of Cincinnati's sports management graduate program. The cohort of early professionals was looking for experiential learning and understanding of the grant writing process, and ABC had plenty of opportunities to share! In collaboration with the program lead, Dr. David Kelley, ABC supported these students in their first grant writing experience and in return was handed five ready-to-submit grant applications and proposals written by capable students. "It was the most natural and synergistic partnership possible," described then Director of Advancement Carmen Lawrence-Billé. "We hope this partnership continues for years to come. The rising tide lifted all ships; everyone who participated in this partnership benefitted, and we had the privilege of introducing an entire cohort of young professionals to nonprofit work."

### Taft High School basketball team wins state championship

In March 2022, the Taft Senators clinched the Division III State Championship by defeating Ottawa-Glandorf with a final score of 48-45. This victory marks their third state title in school history, with previous wins in 1962 and 2011. Head coach Demarco Bradley expressed gratitude to the coaching staff and fans, emphasizing the tremendous support from the city. The proud students credited the win to their resilience and persistence, and thanked their Cincinnati fans for cheering them on and believing in them.



### Hall of Fame

On March 26, 2022, Activities Beyond the Classroom hosted the annual Cincinnati Public Schools (CPS) Athletic Hall of Fame during the All-Star Showcase, hosted at the University of Cincinnati's Fifth Third Arena.

The CPS Athletic Hall of Fame is dedicated to honoring accomplished student athletes from years past. Many of these high school athletes went on to compete at collegiate levels and had careers centered around the games they played. "The honorees are demonstrations to current students of the skills and values that athleticism instills in youth, and how those skills can manifest success in different ways throughout their lives," reflected Ricky Miller.

The cohort of honorees inducted into the Hall of Fame on March 26th included 14 former CPS students and coaches.

### Walnut Hills Ducks dive in the pool

In the 2023 Greater Mansfield Aquatic Swimming and Diving Championships (GMAC), the Walnut Hills Swim Club displayed an impressive defense of their titles. Walnut Hills secured both the boys and girls combined team titles, and retained titles in the boys and girls teams. Notably, swimmer Klete Watters of Walnut Hills set new records in the boys 9-10 25 freestyle, 25 backstroke, and 50 freestyle. Furthermore, the backstroke record Watters broke was the oldest on the GMAC books, set 46 years ago! Congratulations to Watters and all his Duck teammates for this outstanding triumph.

# Western Hills dives back into swimming

The revival of Western Hills High School's swimming program in 2023 is a testament to the dedication and vision of ABC's then Athletic Director Phillip O'Neal and the school's Spanish teacher, Amanda Snyder. After nearly three decades without a swim team, O'Neal's commitment to expanding opportunities for students and Snyder's passion for ensuring that every student has access to the life-saving skill of swimming drove the program's resurgence. Despite starting from scratch, with only two swimmers having prior experience, the team worked tirelessly to build their skills. They practiced at the Gamble-Nippert YMCA, and the program provided a sense of belonging and purpose to students, with one parent noting a significant improvement in their child's well-being. While currently operating as a club team, Western Hills aims to elevate swimming to an official varsity sport, with plans to expand the roster and offer summer programs to nurture future talent. This revival underscores the power of dedicated individuals in shaping the lives of students and the community.



# **Elementary Athletics**

### **Swimming for Safety**

ABC's original swimming program returned in Spring of 2023 to Taft Elementary School. In collaboration with the Cincinnati Recreation Commission, this program teaches young students the essential safety skills of basic swimming techniques, how to identify and reach the edge of a pool, and how to survive if they fall in water. ABC provided swimsuits, flip flops, and towels for approximately 100 kids, and the program took place during the school day, making it as easy as possible for students to participate. This program is set to continue and expand in future school years.

### **ABC Soccer**

Soccer came back with a bang after COVID, with over 500 students at 30 schools participating in fall and spring seasons in the 2022-2023 school year. Many partners joined forces to help reinvigorate the soccer program, including FCC Foundation, TQL, and Anthem Insurance.

Each season culminated with an End-of-Season Soccer Celebration at Stargel and TQL Stadiums. During the celebrations, students participated in scrimmages, art projects, wellness programming, and skills clinics. Every student received a soccer ball, shin guards, water bottle, cleats, and a special certificate from FCC.





### Martial Arts

At Hartwell Elementary school, students stay after school to work on their focus, discipline, and forms with ABC's partners at Five White Tigers, led by Master RJ Trusty. This long standing program has endured the years and supported the social- emotional skills and character development of over one hundred students. Students who participate in the program experience heightened confidence, self-esteem, empowerment, and self-efficacy, and these skills reflect in their academic performance.

# **Cleveland Parker Field**

On June 17, 2023, ABC was honored at the ribbon cutting for the new Cleveland Parker III field at the Avondale Recreation Center. The event was attended by such luminaries as Mayor Aftab Pureval, Congressman Greg Landsman, and Cincinnati Reds COO & President Phil Castelliniand of course, Red's mascot Mr. Red Legs himself.

By providing a safe and accessible space for diamond sports, the field becomes a catalyst for personal growth, team building, and healthy lifestyles. Beyond the immediate benefits of physical activity, diamond sports cultivate important life skills such as discipline, teamwork, and perseverance. By supporting the Reds Community Fund in this initiative, ABC is actively working to bridge the gap in access to such opportunities and foster a sense of belonging among young individuals in Cincinnati.











ABC Resource Coordinators are creative and collaborative individuals that thrive in ever changing environments. Establishing Community Learning Centers within their respective schools, Resource Cordinators participate as the key leader in the school's needs assessment process to identify gaps in service for students, families, and the surrounding community. Once needs are identified, Resource Coordinators work with their community partners to pull together and provide the resources that support the students and their families.

"We feel it's so important for every student to feel their best when they come to school," commented ABC Resource Coordinator Taneeka Porter. Not only did the event see a high turn out, but the event



successfully engaged parents and families at a time when schools typically struggle to. Caregivers and students were able to visit the school, get to know the layout, and meet important teachers, staff members, and partners, making the first day of school a breeze.

### Woodford tennis team's trip to the Western & Southern Open

Thanks to the generosity of a tremendous donor, Woodford Academy started a tennis program with the help of ABC three years ago. The program became very popular and as a result, players on the team asked to see a professional tennis match in person. Then Resource Coordinator at Woodford, James Lacey, worked with ABC to get tickets for the students to attend the 2022 Western & Southern Open. Eight students attended the event along with Lacey and their coach, and they watched four tennis matches throughout the day. Students left with lasting memorabilia from Western & Southern as well as ABC swag bags.

### Douglass families celebrate collective growth

In Spring 2023, Frederick Douglass School's state report card rose from a 2 to a 3.5 star, due to improvements in academic and other metrics. "This is a huge success for Douglass staff and students," ABC Resource Coordinator Angel Griffin shared. To celebrate the school's success, Douglass hosted a red carpet event in which students and families enjoyed music and a catered meal, and received framed certificates. Special thanks to Union Savings Bank for supporting this celebration.





### Silverton Color Fun Runs

Each spring for the past two years, the city of Silverton hosted a Color Fun Run at Ralph Ficke Park. During this event, individuals raced throughout a course in Silverton while spectators attempted to squirt paint and hoist colored powder packets on the runners. This fundraising event was organized primarily by the staff at Silverton Elementary, with all collected money going toward supporting the needs of the school. ABC's Resource Coordinator at Silverton, Cheri Jordan, was heavily involved in planning the logistics of the event, and helped check in all registrants on the day of the event.

ABC was proud to sponsor this event and provide participating kids with gifts of backpacks, water bottles, and bluetooth speakers.

### Rockdale's mental health partnership with Cincinnati Children's Hospital

Rockdale Academy and ABC's Resource Coordinator placed there, Heather England (an award winning Resource Coordinator), collaborate and partner with Dr. Shaffer of Cincinnati Children's Hospital and Medical Center to s upport the SPARK (Simons Foundation Powering Autism Research for Knowledge) DEI Initiative. The initiative aims to better support families and students diagnosed with autism. Rockdale Academy provided physical space and support for all events, and the Resource Coordinator attends monthly meetings and programs, including information sessions about the initiative, 2 Parents Night Out events, and a 2-Day summer camp in June.

# Spotlight on Spencer

Resource Coordination looks different at every school and in every community. So let's zoom in on an example and take a look at what's going on at Spencer Educational Center, where ABC has placed an award winning RC, Karen Hordinski. Here are some of the game changers and difference makers she's responsible for at the school.

### Student Ambassador Leadership **Program at Spencer**

Karen initiated a student ambassador program aimed at bolstering school-wide initiatives through the collaboration of student leaders. To join the program, students were required to complete an application, articulating the reasons behind their desire to be a part of this collective. Their duties include serving as hosts for prospective students to shadow, conducting school tours, spearheading student activities, and much more. The student ambassadors are known as leaders across the school's campus and are afforded additional opportunities to develop social and emotional skills.



Thanks to a partnership with La Soupe, students at Spencer are putting dinner on the table! Hordinski supported a partnership with La Soupe and led the coordination of getting the program in the school to teach Spencer students culinary skills that will support them their entire lives. "It's an incredible program," she commented, "the students are highly engaged." The most delicious part of the program is that it fights food insecurity; students not only learn how to cook in clean and efficient ways, but they also get to take their prepped food home to prepare dinner for their family.

### Barking good time

Hordinski started a partnership with Canines 4 Christ, an international Christian-based nonprofit focused on training and sharing animal-assisted therapy ministry that uses ordinary people and their beloved dogs to share love, hope, kindness, and compassion to the community.

The program also encourages volunteerism and kindness to animals. The organization brought dogs out to Spencer twice in May 2023, and are planned to bring the dogs out monthly next school year. "The therapy dogs were wildly successful in the building," Hordinski proudly shared, "kids and teachers loved it!"











### Hartwell wins basketball championships

In February 2023, Hartwell School boys and girls basketball teams went undefeated and won their championship games. Coaches James Wilson, Greg Mason, and Chrishawna Stewart held students to high academic standards, requiring a minimum of a 3.0 GPA in order to be on the team. "This inspired many of the players who weren't on the honor roll before the season to study hard and get there when the season started. The players were trying to make sure they had the best GPA on the team, taking their competitive nature off the court and into their books," shared Cyril Martin, the ABC Resource Coordinator placed at Hartwell School. "It was powerful to see how our coaches, none of whom were teachers, could have such a tremendous impact on academic performance."



### Alpha Delta Boule adopts Winton Hills

Alpha Delta Boule is a national non-profit organization with a local chapter that is heavily involved in helping students at Cincinnati Public Schools through various programs and opportunities. Alpha Delta Boule has been very active at Winton Hills Academy over the past few years, forming a strong relationship with Shelby Zimmer, ABC's Resource Coordinator. This partnership formalized in 2022 when Alpha Delta Boule adopted Winton Hills. This connection has created numerous opportunities for students at Winton Hills, such as Donuts With Dudes and Muffins With Mom events that promote parental and guardian engagement; the Achievement Behavior Consistency Awards Ceremony, which encourages safe and positive behavior in schools; the Men of Honor Ceremony, motivating boys to model high integrity and moral behaviors; a coat drive for students in need; and many more endeavors that benefit the students, families, and community of Winton Hills.

### Che(ss)viot

ABC's Resource Coordinator at Cheviot Elementary, Onyango Collier, brought the Cris Collinsworth ProScan Fund to their school to offer enrichment to students in 2nd and 3rd grade. The program places trained chess instructors in elementary, middle, and high schools throughout Greater Cincinnati to teach the game to local students. Cheviot has had roughly 10 students participate in the club each year for the past few years.



### Tea time at Roselawn with Rosie Red

Prior to pandemic-mandated social distancing, Roselawn Condon Elementary held an annual Mother and Daughter Tea Party for their students and families. In October 2023, with the help of ABC's Resource Coordinator, Darcus Anderson, Roselawn was finally able to bring this event back! Darcus worked with her local community council, LSDMC, and the Cincinnati Reds to provide food and drink for this tea party, which Rosie Red attended along with over 50 families.

### Aiken's high tunnel project

As a part of Aiken High School's agriculture career pathway, and through the strategic work of ABC's Resource Coordinator placed at the school, Dana Bierman, the school was awarded a grant from the United States Department of Agriculture to support their High Tunnel Initiative. A High Tunnel System, also commonly called a "hoop house," is an increasingly popular conservation practice for farmers, which extends growing seasons, improves plant and soil quality, and reduces energy usage. Thanks to this program, students are able to learn about cutting edge agriculture technology in their high school's backyard; and can take home the yummy produce to help feed their families!
